Early intervention via the Toddler programme, alongside other wraparound whānau/tamariki supports, may significantly contribute to minimising emotional and behavioural problems in the future. Keynote Speakers

Dr Carolyn Webster-Stratton

Presentation Topic: Promoting diversity and a transcultural approach

Carolyn Webster-Stratton, MS, MPH, PhD, Professor Emeritus at the University of Washington, is a licensed clinical psychologist and paediatric nurse practitioner, and the founder of the Incredible Years Series for Parents, Children, and Teachers.

She has conducted numerous RCTs to evaluate the effectiveness of programmes for promoting social and emotional competence, school readiness skills, and preventing conduct problems in high-risk populations. She has also evaluated teacher, parent, and child treatment programmes for children diagnosed with oppositional defiant disorder, conduct disorder, and ADHD.



The Incredible Years programmes have been delivered in more than 24 countries, in ten languages. Dr. Webster-Stratton has published numerous scientific articles and chapters as well as books for parents, teachers, therapists, and children. She has received the National Mental Health Lela Rowland Prevention Award; National Mental Health Research Scientist Award; Dale Richmond/Justin Coleman Lectureship Award from the American Academy of Paediatrics; Trailblazer Award from Association for Behavioural and Cognitive Therapies; Distinguished Career Award from APA Society of Clinical and Adolescent Psychology, and a Doctor Honoris Causa from the Université de Sherbrooke.

Dorothy Taare-Smith

Presentation Topic: Decolonising the autism spectrum in Aotearoa

Dorothy Taare-Smith has worked in the disability sector for well over 20 years as a teacher-aide, teacher, specialist teacher, advocate, and advisor. Dorothy is the founder of Taonga Takiwātanga Charitable Trust (TTCT) which was established in 2020 to address the unmet needs of whānau Māori seeking authentic Kaupapa Māori support for their Taonga Takiwātanga (whānau member on the Autism spectrum). The core business of TTCT is to deliver Marae-based professional development and support to whānau living in highly populated Māori communities in Te Tairāwhiti.



Dorothy has a particular interest in the area of Takiwātanga – Autism from a Māori perspective where she has identified key implications for Te Whānau Takiwātanga seeking cultural authenticity in the Education, Health, and Justice sector.

Dorothy is a member of the Living Guidelines Group (LGG), a national Autism advisory group that works closely with the Ministry of Education and Whaikaha. The core role of the LGG is to advise Government agencies about best practice approaches to supporting those who work closely with people on the Autism spectrum.

Dorothy's academic accolades: Diploma in Child Protection Studies – Child Matters NZ Bachelor of Education (Teaching) – The University of Auckland Post Graduate Diploma in Specialist Teaching (Autism Spectrum Disorder) – Massey University Master of Specialist Teaching (Autism Spectrum Disorder) – Massey University.

Presenter Bios

Dianne Lees - IYP Mentor, IYP-A Mentor-in-Training

Dianne is a clinical psychologist with many years of experience working with children and families. She has a background in secondary school teaching and Playcentre Early Childhood before retraining as a clinical psychologist.

Her journey with Incredible Years began in 2001 when she completed her Basic Parent Training. Back then, Dianne had a dream to see all Parent, Child, and Teacher Incredible Years programmes available in New Zealand and introduced IY to the Health and Education sectors in New Zealand.



Her research includes an evaluation of the effectiveness of Incredible Years Parent Programme for solo mothers of children with ADHD, and an RCT

evaluation of adding a home visiting intervention to improve outcomes for high risk families attending IYP. Dianne is experienced in delivering Baby, Toddler, Basic, School Age, Advanced, and Autism parent programmes. Dianne continues to deliver group leader training, peer coaching, and support for IY facilitators in NZ.

Tania Anstiss - IYP Mentor, IYP-A Acc Peer Coach

Tania is Psychology Lead at the Infant, Child, and Youth Mental Health Service at Te Whatu Ora - Health NZ, Waitemata. Tania also works clinically in the Matua Tuhononga (Infant Mental Health) team. Tania is passionate about intervening early with whānau and tamariki, and has always enjoyed providing support for whānau in their parenting journey.

Tania has focused on workforce development for some years and is an accredited Mentor and Peer Coach in the Incredible Years Parent programme. She also provides professional supervision through her private practice. Tania has a national leadership role as President of the New Zealand Psychological Society and is a strong advocate for the Psychology Workforce in Aotearoa.

Diana Linforth-Howden - IYP Mentor

Diana is a Mentor for the IY Basic Parent Programme. She also provides supervision to group leaders beginning this work. Diana has worked in the NGO and tertiary mental health sectors for 20 years, before setting up the Incredible Families Trust, with two of her colleagues and her husband in 2006.

A co-trustee delivers Watch, Wait & Wonder - an Infant/Parent programme and Diana and her team raise money to deliver various Incredible Years programmes in the greater Wellington area, including the Basic Incredible Years Parent Programme, the IY Autism programme, and the Dinosaur school programme.

The Trust has contracts with Ministry of Education to deliver Incredible Years Basic parent programme and IY Autism Programme. On a personal level, Diana is married, has four children and has five precious little grandchildren.





Lisa Herewini - IYP Mentor

Lisa is a registered Social Worker with the Ministry of Health's Child Adolescent Mental Health Services in Tauranga, NZ. Lisa joined the Health Sector with over 20 years' experience working with children and their whānau in the non-Government Field of Social Services. She holds a post-graduate Diploma in Professional Bi-Cultural Supervision, and leads the Incredible Years Māori Workforce Development Plan and Advisory Group with Auckland University's Whāraurau Team.

Lisa's journey with Incredible Years began in 2004. She is experienced in delivering the Preschool, School Age, and Autism Programmes.



Lisa has also become the first Māori accredited Mentor in Aotearoa New Zealand, and delivers Fidelity Workshops, Consultation Days, Kaimahi Hui, Telehui, and co-leads Trainings for IYP. Above all else, Lisa descends proudly from the Mataatua Waka. Her passion for children and whānau stems from her own experiences having been raised on her papakainga immersed in the cultural traditions of her whānau, hapu and Iwi. Ma te atua, hei manaaki.

Jens Andersen - IYP Mentor, IYT Acc Peer Coach

Jens Andersen is a Registered Psychologist who has been with the Ministry of Education since 2004. Prior to this he worked with at risk youth and has also managed to clock up a few hours cooking and snowboarding along the way.

Jens was trained to deliver the Incredible Years Basic Parent programme in 2005 and is now a Mentor for the Incredible Years Parent programme and an accredited Peer Coach for the Teacher programme. This sees him delivering programmes in Hawkes Bay as well as supporting practice across Aotearoa in his role with MOE Te Pae Aronui.



Michelle Wood - IYP Mentor-in-Training

Michelle is an Educational Psychologist with the Ministry of Education Learning Support team in Palmerston North. She is the Practice Lead for the Learning Support behaviour teams across the Taranaki, Whanganui, & Manawatu region and has a special interest in supporting families who have children with significant behavioural needs. She currently delivers the Behaviour and Wellbeing training for behaviour practitioners across the region. Michelle is an accredited group leader and peer coach for the Incredible Years Parent programme and also delivers the Incredible Years Teacher (ECE) programme. Most recently her focus has been on delivering the Incredible Years Toddler programme to vulnerable parents

Michele has worked with whānau Māori in her personal life, hapū and kāhui involved in Te Tiriti o Waitangi negotiations, and for Te Tāhuhu o te Mātauranga | the Ministry of Education working with tamariki/mokopuna with learning disabilities.

Michele has also been nominated as a Mentor-in-training in the IY Teacher programme to provide group leader support both at group leader trainings and consultation days. She has also trained in the Incredible Beginnings programme.





Sheila Russell - IYT-A Mentor, IYT Acc Peer Coach

Sheila Russell has a background in early childhood education as a kindergarten teacher and an early intervention teacher working in schools, preschools and extensively with families.

Over the last ten years she has worked full time delivering Incredible Years Programmes and supporting others through peer coaching. She is an accredited peer coach in the Incredible Years Parent Programme, Incredible Years Teacher Programme, and Incredible Years Teacher Autism Programme. 
General Information
